I have particularly found many Moments of Grace and Blessing in visiting the homes of many in our community, both day and boarding. For 2025, I have been able to visit 276 country towns (at the time of writing) and this has given me valuable insights into the family life of our community. Mazenod College is a College for the entire state and all of WA is our home.



I have received genuine welcome, hospitality and care and have experienced and heard about: wheat, lupin, canola and barley, farming, cray fishing, port works, country teaching, nursing, policing, sheep farming, pest control and mining. I have got to meet younger and older siblings of our boys and also met many of their family pets, including Norman the cat who liked to swim! This ministry is most definitely life-giving and helps our Oblate ministry of being close to the people that we serve. Visitation was a key element of St Eugene's care for people and he also encouraged Oblates to go as far and wide as possible. Our ministry here in WA allows that to be very real.

I have also had the very real honor of visiting our day boys and their families in hospitals and homes and I am always up for a visit if any family would wish to have one. I am slowly getting to know the suburbs of Perth now that I have a fairly strong grasp of many of the towns of rural WA.

In preparation for the resumption of our Overseas Mission Immersions, I was fortunate to travel to Vietnam with Mr Damian Wallis and Mr Liam Mallon. We were warmly hosted by a very vibrant, young and deeply Oblate Province of Vietnam. In 2026, our Jubilee year, we will invite Year 10-12 students to experience the Oblate Missions and work for a 10 day period. Previously our students have experienced the missions in Sri Lanka, India, Indonesia and China. I look forward to sharing news with you all of how the reintroduced immersion goes.

Next year, 2026, will see the College celebrate with a range of activities and gatherings both within the College as well as the Cathedral, City and Lesmurdie Parish. Please make every effort to attend as many as you possibly can so that we can celebrate, in the most wonderful way, the great community spirit that we enjoy here at the College.

I have been particularly pleased with the generosity of the Mazenod community to the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal and encourage every family to do whatever they can to be as generous as possible and to try as best as you can to attend any of the Christmas services.

Due to the encouraging growth in enrolments, renovation works commenced in mid-October on Wilson House. This project represents another significant investment in ensuring that our boarding community continues to provide the very best living and learning environment for our young men.


The refurbishment will include ten new bedrooms, bathroom facilities, a staff unit and a small common area designed to encourage connection and community among the boys. These upgrades will not only increase our capacity but will also enhance the comfort, supervision and sense of belonging within the Cebula community.

Together with the recently completed Malmia House, the redevelopment of Wilson House will ensure that our facilities remain modern, welcoming and reflective of current best practice in boarding education spaces where boys can grow in independence, responsibility and confidence.

We anticipate that the Wilson House refurbishment will be completed in time for the start of the 2026 school year, and we look forward to sharing with you this wonderful addition to our Cebula community. These developments reflect not only our commitment to excellence but also the growing confidence families have in the opportunities our boarding program provides.

With 2027 marking the 60th Anniversary of boarding at Mazenod, we hope many of you will have the opportunity to visit and enjoy seeing the changes our current cohort of boarders are enjoying.

# MAZENOD OLD BOY SCOTT EWEN (04)

## What is your current job title and what does it involve?

I am the founder and director of Onyx Movement, a company dedicated to advancing movement health education through innovative training across diverse communities. We integrate functional movement training with the principles of contemporary dance into practical approaches for allied and preventative health, offering school incursions, corporate health workshops, falls-prevention programs and psychosocial wellbeing events for older adults. I'm also the creator of two new movement modalities, Onyx Flow (mat-based) and Onyx Rise (chair-based for older adults), which blend functional movement training, contemporary dance and tai chi to enhance mobility, body awareness and confidence. Each is designed to deepen understanding of movement health as the foundation for longevity, physical confidence and independence, while teaching the vital skill of safely moving to and from the floor, a capacity often lost with age. Both modalities will officially launch in 2026.

## Any other personal news you would like to share.

After graduating from the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) with a Bachelor of Arts (Dance), I was offered my first professional contract with Australian Dance Theatre, Australia's pre-eminent contemporary dance company. Over six years, I toured extensively across Australia and internationally, performing works by Artistic Director, Garry Stewart, and acclaimed guest choreographers.

My career later expanded to include performances and tours with Australasian Dance Collective, Tasdance, Buzz Dance Theatre and iDance (Sweden), taking me to more than 20 countries across five continents. As a choreographer, I've been commissioned to create new works for festivals, universities and companies throughout Australia, New Zealand, Asia, North America, Africa and Europe. Since returning to Perth, I've created works for

numerous secondary schools including All Saints College and Santa Maria College, and am currently developing a full-length contemporary dance work for Momentum Dance Company, premiering in July 2026.

Outside the studio, I've chased adventure across the globe. Some of which includes dog sledding through the Arctic Circle, snorkelling between tectonic plates in Iceland, trekking the Himalayas in Nepal, mountain biking Bolivia's Death Road and climbing volcanoes throughout Central America. I've also cage-dived with great white sharks in Australia, scaled to the centre of the Pyramids in Egypt, bungee jumped in New Zealand and I spent three months doing volunteer work in Guatemala.

When the pandemic struck, I returned to Perth as my international projects were cancelled due to global travel restrictions. During that time, I broadened my skills by completing my Enrolled Nurse qualification as part of a traineeship with Fortescue Metals Group whilst working as an Emergency Services Officer. I now run my own business, Onyx Movement, and live in Highgate with my partner, Josh and our dog, Harry.

## Can you reflect back at your time as a student at Mazenod and share one thing that you learnt that has had an influence in your life and/or career?

I was part of Mazenod's first-ever boys' dance group in 2003, led by the incredible teacher, Karla Conway. Although I'd always been active and involved in sport, Karla opened my eyes to how movement could be used as an artistic and expressive language. She recognised my potential and once told me, "Just try every dance style, give everything a chance, and allow time to develop. Practice doesn't make perfect, it makes progress."

That philosophy has stayed with me throughout my dance training, artistic career and life. It taught me the value of curiosity, persistence and staying open to growth, lessons that extend far beyond the studio.



Years later, when I was touring nationally with Australian Dance Theatre, we performed in Canberra, where Karla had become Artistic Director of the Canberra Youth Theatre Company. She attended the performance and we were able to catch up afterwards. She later invited me to deliver a movement-for-actors workshop for her company, a meaningful full-circle moment that reminded me how one teacher's influence can last a lifetime.

**Thinking about your time at Mazenod College, is there something you could share with the current students that may help them on their journey through secondary school?**

While you're going through school, remember to always find something that genuinely brings you joy, and it can't be people or money. Find an activity, hobby or practice that lets you step away from the pressure and noise for a while. Whether it's art, sport, music or spending time outdoors, having something that's just for you helps create balance. That sense of balance isn't just important for your mental health; it's vital for your physical wellbeing too. Learning how to pause, reset and reconnect with something you love will serve you far beyond your school years, it's one of the most powerful habits you can build.

**If there is anything else you would like to include, funny/interesting story, please do.**



Whilst touring to Perth with Australian Dance Theatre back in 2015, The West Australian ran an article about our season at the State Theatre. A former classmate's mum recognised me in the paper and asked her son, Kasey Pass, if it was the same Scott he'd gone to school with. Kasey reached out to me to check, and I told him it was me. He and his wife came to see the performance, and I caught up with them afterwards. I hadn't seen Kasey since we had graduated from Mazenod, so it was really special for him to reach out and it was great to see him.

And earlier this year, I was creating two contemporary dance works for the Perth Youth Ballet, performed at the WA Museum Boola Bardip. After one of the rehearsals, an eight-year-old dancer came up to me and said, "Scott, you went to school with my dad."

When I asked who her dad was, she replied, "Jaiden Beales." I couldn't believe it, Jaiden and I were classmates at Mazenod. I caught up with Jaiden the next day when he dropped his daughter off at rehearsal, and later with his family after one of the performances. It was a really lovely moment; my first time teaching the daughter of a former classmate. It made me realise just how much time has passed.




## MOBA END OF YEAR CATCHUP
