As an alumnus and previous principal of St Norbert College in Queens Park, Mr Harvey's educational pedigree has developed from a similar background and culture to Mazenod. Interestingly, 35 years ago Mr Harvey trotted out on to Mackintosh Oval representing the St Norbert's First XVIII, only to soundly capitulate to the blue and whites. How much did we win by? Well let's just say the end result possibly explains Simon's tardy return to Gladys Road. Ouch! Mazenod eventually went on to win the ACC Premiership that year, against a much more competitive St Norbert College. Following is the excerpt from the August 1987 Newsletter.

Complacency and lack of running saw us trailing by six goals at the end of Term 1. We showed patches of form in the second and third quarters, however, we are in arrears by four (4) goals at three quarter time. In the last 20 minutes, Dean Capobianco and Dave Maher were inspirational with their running and "straight-through" approach. Matthew Priest worked the ball from the centre and backmen Ashton, Emmott and Morgan held off opposition attacks. Our forwards started playing from in front and our handball linked up the play. We finished up winners in a thrilling final quarter. Darryl Peck, Jerry Logan and Jerome Carroll were probably the most consistent workers of the day. The entire team rallied when needed, and the boys are to be congratulated on their efforts. The hallmark of a great team is the ability to comeback from behind .... Go Mazz!

# Vale **SR FRANCES WILSON RNDM**

We were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of our much loved and adored Sr Frances Wilson on July 27. In the words of our Board Chair, Mrs Mary Retel, Sr Frances is "...a very pure, selfless and giving woman, Sr Frances is now basking in eternal peace and joy".

Sr Frances Wilson RNDM, was a member of the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions who worked in WA from 1991. Sr Frances came to WA from New Zealand to begin work at Wanalirri Catholic School at Gibb River, in the Kimberley region. Her teaching during the early years took place in a tin shed in stifling heat, until the new school was built.

Sr Frances' connection to Mazenod began in the late 1990s when a number of Indigenous students from her Gibb River school moved into Boarding at Mazenod.

In 2001 Sr Frances joined the Mazenod community as the College's Aboriginal Liaison Officer. Her time was dedicated to helping any Indigenous boys settle into Mazenod when they made the transition to life in the city. Sr Frances also assisted the Indigenous girls who were boarding at St Brigid's College.

During her time at Mazenod Sr Frances was fully involved in all aspects of school life. As well as assisting the Boarders, she was very active in the Sacramental program, was an important

member of the Educational Support team and was a keen follower of the many sporting pursuits at the College. Sr Frances, as a Kiwi, had a great love of rugby and would often attend various sporting events, particularly rugby matches as a supporter or manager. She took every opportunity to remind students and staff how dominant the All Blacks were in the rugby world. Sr Frances accompanied the school rugby team on a tour of Brisbane as the team manager. Her energy had no bounds as she would walk/jog the annual Mission Fun Run with the students.

Sr Frances was a much loved member of the Mazenod community and while we knew that she was looking forward to going home to New Zealand we were all very sorry to see her leave the College in 2014, after 13 years at Mazenod and 27 years in WA.

The College extends its condolences to the Wilson family and the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions on the loss of Sister Frances Wilson RNDM. Our thoughts and prayers are with them at this incredibly sad time.

Not someone to keep idle or do nothing, Sr Frances concluded by saying, "If I can drive a Toyota truck on the toughest and roughest roads, I can drive anywhere where life takes me."

## JAKE O'BRIEN (18)

**What are you studying/your current job title and what does it involve?**

I'm currently in my final year studying a Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) at Curtin University. It's my 5th year of uni, and it's been one incredible journey thus far! In my final year, the majority of my time is spent on clinical placements. This year, these range from time in ED, Surgery, Medicine, General Practice and other elective placements. A typical day has so much variety in it, which keeps my mind active and is something I've really come to love about the career of medicine. No two days are the same and it's a certain level of interest and excitement knowing the next patient who walks in the door can bring an entirely different experience than the last. If I'm not attending clinical placement, it means I'm probably back to uni covering lectures, revising practical and procedural skills, or catching up with friends for a much-needed study group revision session. I've come to learn studying medicine is the quintessential metaphor for 'it's a marathon, not a sprint.' The days (and nights) are long, the study seems never ending, and the reward can feel limited at times. It's taught me a lot about personal reflection, being comfortable with the uncomfortable, and accepting the to-do-list is never complete. Notwithstanding, it's the career I've so gratefully been accepted into and one I know is the absolute right choice for me. Last year I was so fortunate to be accepted onto the Rural Clinical School whereby I spent my penultimate year of study in beautiful Busselton. It's a collaboration of WA's 3 medical schools and is the perfect opportunity to experience the joys of living in rural WA, contributing to the team, and diving

right into the deep end of medical practice. Moving to Busselton meant time away from the lectures and tutorials I'd spent the last 3 years doing at uni, and it's safe to say it's a move I was well and truly excited for! I learnt so much from my fellow medical student housemates, the incredible teaching staff, and all the other medical and allied health staff in Busselton, Margaret River and surrounds. It truly was the perfect year of gaining essential medical skills in an amazing holiday destination.

**Any other personal news you would like to share: travels, married/single, kids, currently location, involved with sports/music/art, work/career highlights.**

I've come to learn the importance of finding passion and hobbies outside of medicine. It can be a very consuming field and at times, hard to let go of. In line with the previous metaphor, I've really come to love the solitude, escape and physical challenge of marathon running. I'll be the first to admit I know it's not for everyone. I'm aware it takes a certain kind of person to find joy in waking up and going for a 4-hour run on a Sunday morning! For me, running is the perfect way to switch off after a long day and clear my head. It helps make me more present when I'm with friends and family. It's truly changed my life for the better. It's not just running I've found a passion for, but also swimming. I was asked by a friend a few years ago to join the Rottnest Channel Swim in a team event. Having never been a regular swimmer, it meant training was on, and I discovered my next favourite activity to escape from the world. There's a lot one can learn about themselves from staring at the same black line on the bottom of the pool



for 100 laps, believe me! I have no doubts my passion for endurance sports has been compounded by my studies and finding a healthy outlet to manage these demands.

**Can you reflect back at your time as a student at Mazenod and share one thing that you learnt that has had an influence on you and your career? This is not limited to something you learnt in a subject, but it may be the influence of a person, belonging to a team or ensemble, service you did or perhaps something you experienced on a tour or immersion.**

When I was in Year 9 at Mazenod, my world was turned upside down and things were never going to be the same. I was physically very unwell, tired all the time, eating and drinking like no tomorrow, and falling asleep in class! I was then diagnosed with type 1 diabetes – an autoimmune condition characterised by the body's inability to produce insulin, an essential hormone for glucose absorption. This meant a life of daily insulin injections, blood sugar monitoring, an additional (on average) 180-extra decisions each day, and the mental burden of knowing if I didn't diligently focus on my diabetes, I'd more than likely pay for it with complications in older adult life. As a mere 14-year-old, this was an enormous shock for me, my family and friends. Leaving the hospital on my Dad's birthday, we all knew just how different life was going to be. I also knew it wasn't going to stop me from achieving my dreams and aspirations. It was simply a hurdle I had to deal with – all day, every day. I had the most incredible support from the staff at the then Princess Margaret Hospital (PMH), teaching staff at Mazenod, and friends and family who came along with me to fundraising events and functions. I took my diabetes in my stride, and used it as my 'why' to

prove I could still do anything and everything I wanted to in life. Although sometimes the daily struggle can seem insurmountable, I have the absolute confidence when I say being diagnosed with diabetes was the best thing that ever happened to me. It's taught me so much about resilience, empathy and a genuine understanding that we're all going through our own challenges. It's taught me to embrace every day, treat everyone with kindness and do my bit to make a mark on the world. For that, I'm eternally grateful!

**Thinking about your time in Mazenod College, is there something you could share with current students that may help them on their journey through secondary school?**

It's the same message I was told when I was a student at Mazenod, but it still rings true to me today. Get involved in everything! The College has so much to offer, regardless of your interests or hobbies. My greatest memories of my time at Mazenod were on the Singapore Hockey Tour and on the Mount Gambier Jazz Band Tours. Opportunities like these are so rewarding as a student and incredibly important for personal growth. I learned so much in my classes at Mazenod that have proven essential for my current studies. But, I've also learned so much about who I am as a person, what makes me get up in the morning and what fuels my fire inside to continue to chase my passions. Take every opportunity that Mazenod offers you. It's truly the most supportive, empowering and nurturing community I've been a part of – one I'll forever be grateful to have called home.

# FR DONALD OSWIN HUGHES OMI

It was with great sadness that the Australian Province of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate received the news of the passing of Fr Don Hughes OMI on July 21, 2020. Fr Don lived a full and active life as a faithful Oblate and generous Priest and even at the age of 87, had been present in the Mazenod College Western Australia community supporting students and staff. Earlier in the year he refused further aggressive treatment for his cancer, which he had battled with for many years.

In his ministry as an Oblate, he was involved in Education, Formation and Parish ministry. Fr Don was an Oblate who generously responded to the needs of the Province.

Born in Fremantle, WA on 23rd August 1932, and educated at CBC Fremantle, Fr Don Intended to be a diocesan priest and he studied philosophy at St Charles Seminary in Guilford WA. He then joined the Oblates in 1953 at Sorrento. In 1954 he went to study theology at Piltown, Ireland where he was ordained on September 15 1957.

His first obedience was 3 months at Holy Cross, Liverpool, UK before he returned to Australia, to Sorrento. In his first 2 years he was also at Penshurst NSW, Beaconsfield WA and Camberwell Vic. He taught at Iona College 1961-65, then came to Mazenod WA as our rector in 1966 until 1972.

Fr Don was then rector of St Mary's Seminary until January 1976, when he moved to Massey New Zealand as parish priest until 1982, then Rosebud Vic for 14 months followed by Tea Tree Gully SA until the end of 1989.

From 1990 to 1995 he was novice master then Rector of St Mary's Seminary for a second term, followed by 10 years of parish ministry in WA, at Fremantle then Lesmurdie. He was then Rector of St Charles Seminary (archdiocesan), Guildford WA for two and a half years, then had a year back as novice master at St Mary's Seminary, Mulgrave.

He joined the Mazenod College community in Lesmurdie in 2011. There he loved watching sporting matches, was involved with the boys, and was seen as a witness of faith and reassuring presence and pastoral support to both students and staff.

Fr Don was a generous Oblate, serving a number of terms on the Provincial Council, and was willing to go wherever he was asked, to do whatever was needed. He has been in all the Oblate ministries - he has been missionary, parish priest, teacher, college and seminary rector, formator. He was passionately interested in the congregation: he has been the historian of the province and the keeper of the stories.

Fr Don Hughes will be greatly missed.







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
