MOBA look forward to sharing some fun times and big announcements in 2024. Stay tuned for an innovative initiative, designed to support our boarding families.



FAREWELL MR RONAN

It is hard to believe the day has come for us to announce the retirement of Mr Jeffrey Ronan. Jeff announced to the College earlier in the year that 2023 would be his final one at the College and Friday 1 December was his final day with the students. A constant of the College for 42 years, with Jeff's retirement, the Payne-Douthie-Ronan era that defined what Mazenod is to so many people in the community comes to a close.

Jeff started as a student in 1970 and proved himself to be an excellent student, talented athlete and gifted footballer. He graduated in 1976 as College Captain and started teaching at Mazenod in 1981. Fr McMahon OMI claims that one of the best decisions he ever made was to employ Jeff. He tells us there wasn't even an interview! Mainly teaching maths, PE and humanities, Jeff coached numerous football and swimming teams, taught photography, was Head of Year, and served as Acting Principal.

In 1995, Jeff was appointed Deputy Principal by Fr Peter Daly OMI, and it is in this role where he really left his mark. He was instrumental in establishing the College's high academic and behavioural expectations, the espousal of its values and the clarity around what it means to be a Mazenod Man. Firm, tough at times, but always fair, Jeff has always had the best interests of the students and College as his first priority. His experience and passion for the College has made him a great mentor to his colleagues (particularly Heads of Year) and a great source of advice and wisdom. He has also ensured that the College retains its own identify through his knowledge of the College's history and traditions.

During his time as Deputy, there has hardly been an event that Jeff was not present at or had a hand in its organisation and running. If there is a photograph of a College event, there is a very high chance it was taken by Jeff, and this is evident by the fact it has been tough to find photos of him from the past 42 years (he's always behind the camera).

Jeff has taught, mentored, disciplined and counselled decades worth of Mazenod Old Boys. He has been instrumental in the formation of young men who graduate from the College with an understanding of accountability, personal values and self-discipline. His dedication to the Mazenod Community is unsurpassable and it is hard to imagine the College without him. JR is an absolute Mazenod legend and is highly respected by staff, students, parents and Old Boys. Mr Ronan, on behalf of the Mazenod Old Boys and the whole College community thank you for your 42 years of service and we wish you a well earned and thoroughly deserved retirement.

What are you studying/your current job title and what does it involve?

I'm currently working as a Warehouse Officer in Cape Preston at Sino Iron Pacific Mining. My daily duties range from transport and logistics duties (truck loading/unloading freight) receipting of goods (data entry and stock control) machine operating (trucks, forklifts of various sizes and capacities) customer service (assisting other companies/contractors on site to locate items for use). I work a 2:1 roster (FIFO). Studying is done internally for level/career progression within.

As of Valentine's Day this year, I am engaged to my beautiful fiance who is also 5 months pregnant with our first child, due in early July 2024. I'm currently living in Belmont and travelled to the USA for the first time in early 2019. I travelled from the east coast of America to the west, stopping in 10 cities - New York, Charlotte, Orlando, Ohio, Chicago, Detroit, Portland, San Francisco, Las Vegas and Los Angeles. Whilst travelling I took Michael Jordan's first and rarest figurine to multiple places which Michael Jordan was/is closely associated with.

Can you reflect back at your time as a student at Mazenod and share one thing that you learnt that has had an influence on you and your career?

Looking back 30 years later on my time as a student at Mazenod, I'm filled with gratitude for attending a school that was then, and I imagine still is today, steeped in sports and fostering a relationship with God. My passion for basketball was starting as I entered Year 8, and continued all the way through and hasn't stopped yet! Playing basketball against other students, was not only looked forward to during recess and lunch breaks but also allowed a more competitive and healthy environment for all who participated. It enabled no discrimination nor harm and allowed us to bond and banter. I'm also grateful for the "planting of the religious seed" that I still nurture today as my life and love for Christ continues to grow and I understand my relationship with God too. Mazenod gave me these fundamentals which I still incorporate into my life daily.

Thinking about your time in Mazenod College, is there something you could share with current students that may help them on their journey through secondary school?

I would share this piece of advice or words with today's students that reflect even my time at Mazenod from 30 years ago. Be true to yourself! Don't follow the herd, follow your heart. It's OK to be different. NEVER give up or stop believing



in yourself or your dreams no matter how crazy others might think it to be. Be kind, respectful of others and especially your teachers. Time goes by quickly so make the most of it. Don't deny God into your life and be grateful for your health daily. Tell those you love that YOU do love them. Dream big and be consistent, patient and pleasant. Never forget where you come from so you'll always remember how far you've came. Finally, understand that just like me, it may take decades to find your true calling and destiny, but never, ever quit. If you do, you'll find quitting to be easy and may never experience the joy of winning or your true potential.

Is there is anything else you would like to include, funny/interesting story,

I'm beyond pleased and proud to be internationally and locally known, not just as the owner of the WORLD'S BIGGEST, BEST AND RAREST MICHAEL JORDAN TOY COLLECTION but also as THE guy who discovered Michael Jordan's first figurine from 1987. I've been featured here on TV in Perth (Today Tonight), been interviewed on radio several times, been featured in The West Australian and Perth Now, been featured in 2 international magazines (Sneaker Freaker Magazine issue #42 and MILK Magazine - Hong Kong), appear on Google searches under both my name "Joshua De Vaney" and "Michael Jordan's rarest toy". I was the first and only fan to be invited by the Perth Wildcats in 30 years, and the NBL to put on a Michael Jordan toy display at the RAC Arena on Mother's Day 2021 during a home game for fans to enjoy. I have had conversations with several people

closely linked to Michael Jordan and shared my collection with them such as Reggie Miller, Marcus Jordan (second son of MJ himself) Howard "H" White (Vice President of The Jordan Brand), Luc Longley (former 3 times championship teammate) as well as several well known Perth Wildcats (Bryce Cotton, Jesse Wagstaff, Damien Martin, Mike Ellis, Coach John Rillie, Shawn Redhage, Eric Watterson) and even Nic Natinui to mention a few. I've done all this single handedly through passion, persistence and dedication to add value to The GOAT'S legacy and in pursuit of meeting MJ himself. This is a huge feat given our remote location and with only having an Instagram account of less than 2.5k followers. In the Michael Jordan collectors world, I managed to break through and remain at the top of my specific interest, his toys, for close to a decade now. There's so much more to share, discuss and divulge, however I'm limited to this interview and my dream (bucket list) item is to come back to Mazenod, with a large number of toys and share more of my unique and interesting stories with current students in order to inspire, educate, uplift and share my passion and collection in the very place that fostered and started my love for basketball 30 years ago.

What are you studying/your current job title and what does it involve?

I am currently working for Nomura Research Institute (NRI) Australia as a Principal Consultant in their consulting and advisory services area. Over the past two decades I've had the pleasure of working with a wide range of clients across different industries and governments, both here in Perth and abroad, on solving different problems and delivering better outcomes for companies, shareholders, governments and the wider community. My last major client engagement last year was leading the WA State Government's Cyber Security Risk Remediation and Uplift program of work to improve security controls and manage risk across our State's whole of government platforms.

Also outside of management consulting, I'm the part-owner of an events company that brings unique experiences and festival events to Perth. Next month we have the West Coast Pinball Festival being hosted at Belmont Park (westcoastpinballfestival.com). The festival is the largest pinball expo in the southern hemisphere with over 150 pinball machines, and is hosting the 2024 Australian Pinball Championships. Later this year we're also working on bringing some other unique events from the US to Australia for the first time.

I'm married with 2 children (3 year old girl - Cleo, and 3 month old boy - Arlo). I was fortunate to travel the world for triathlon 2010-2014 and represented Australia at both the ITU Olympic and Ironman World Championships. These days my sporting days are well behind me.

Can you reflect back at your time as a student at Mazenod and share one thing that you learnt that has had an influence on you and your career? This is not limited to something you learnt in a subject, but it may be the influence of a person, belonging to a team or ensemble, service you did or perhaps something you experienced on a tour or immersion.

Reflecting on my time at Mazenod, the greatest influence on me personally that has helped me both in my career, sport and personal life - the sense of community and belonging to something greater than oneself. As a student at the time it's not something you necessarily realise and obviously take for granted, but it's something that has a lasting impact on your outlook and life. Other students I keep in touch with and have bumped into even from different year groups have said the same thing.

Thinking about your time in Mazenod College, is there something you could share with current students that may help them on their journey through secondary school?

Although it may be very difficult to imagine right now, your time at Mazenod and secondary school goes by very fast. I have young nephews who have been through Mazenod, graduated and are out in the workforce or studying already. Blink and it's gone - so make the most of it. Take advantage of the opportunities in front of you, dedicate yourself to the things you're passionate about (sport etc.) but also focus on bettering yourself in your studies or working towards employment or your chosen career. At this stage in your life, even the smallest improvements and efforts to better yourself do make a real difference down the track - what you practice now and how you apply yourself will shape the person you'll become in the future.



CLASS OF 1973 50 YEAR REUNION

Outside the Principal's office is a 2008 photo of Fr Hughes OMI, Phil Pringle (early Maths teacher) and just over 20 fossils. Certain odd coincidences in the first half of 2023 led former students from that photo to realize that it was 50 years since the Mazenod WA Class of 1973 graduated.

By the marvels of modern technology, the detective work of some 15 years ago, and some dogged stalking, it was possible to contact over half of the students of the cohort - the third year to graduate from Mazenod. A reunion date was set at Saturday 4th November.

Many could not be located, some were unable to attend, and a few were reluctant, but the number attending was remarkable. Sadly, at least a dozen have died, some relatively soon after graduation. While the graduating number was 30, over the years, with students coming and going, the total cohort was over 70. That number was reached primarily due to the work of the College's Archivist, Maria Pagotto, who tracked down every class photo and several others besides.

So, we met to tell tall tales, share a drink and catch a photo or two. And the amazing thing is that none of us has changed at all - we all looked our late teenage selves. Well, a couple of minor changes may have occurred, particularly in the follicular department.

It was a long time since our last reunion fifteen years ago. We parted this time with good intentions to meet again a lot sooner.
